Notes: In 1487 Bartolomeu Dias was the first European to discover Angra Pequena, now called Lüderitz in Namibia.

On November 16, 1882, Adolf Lüderitz, a German merchant from Bremen, requested German protection for a trading s that he planned to build at Angra Pequena. After protection had been granted, one of his employees, Heinrich Vogelsar bought land in the surrounding region from the local Nama chief Josef Frederiks II. This territory was named Lüderitz-La

On 24 April 1884 Lüderitz transferred his rights over Angra Pequena and Lüderitz-Land to the German Imperial Govern deter British encroachment. In early 1884, the gunboat SMS Nautilus visited to review the situation. A favourable report government, and acquiescence from the British, resulted in a visit from the SMS Leipzig and SMS Elisabeth. The Germ was finally raised in Southwest Africa on 7 August 1884. In October, the newly appointed Commissioner for West Africa Gustav Nachtigal, arrived on the SMS Möwe.

The date of 5 July 1844 refers to the day on which Germany first established colonies in West Africa and when Dr. Gus Nachtigal was appointed Commissioner for all German possessions in West Africa.
