Obverse: Within a toothed border round the rim, conjoined heads of the King and Queen, right, he bareheaded, she diademed, splaurel and ribbon below. Legend: "KING EDWARD VII (cross) QUEEN ALEXANDRA".

Reverse: Within a beaded circle, ornaments above and below, across: "MALMESBURY". Within a toother border round the rim, leabove: "TO COMMEMORATE THEIR MAJESTIES CORONATION" and below between ornamental stops: "JUNE 26TI

Notes: The town of Malmesbury is in the Western Cape about 65 km north of Cape Town. Malmesbury was so named in 1829 British diplomat, the Earl of Malmesbury, who had died in 1820.
